




On behalf of myself I'd like to thank all those people who deserve to be thanked for another successful year, and look forward to next year when the agrarian policies of the social club come to fruition.





1990 GRAND FINAL TEAM MANDURAH LADIES





coach Graham Wood as spectators witnessed him throwing a water container onto the field.




